WARREN SOLDIER DROWNS WHILE ON MISSION

GI Dies In Vietnam

WARREN – Sgt. Stanley F. Farro, a 1967 Warren Woods High School graduate who has been in Vietnam less than a month, drowned while on his fourth combat mission, the Army has informed his parents.

Although details were not immediately available, the family was told the death occurred in the Mekong Delta while the soldier was serving with the 9th Division.

“I really don’t know what to say, “said Ernest Farro, father of the 20 year-old sergeant, “the only information we have received is that our son was drowned while on a combat mission.”

Sergeant Farro was drafted March 4, 1968, and arrived in Vietnam Jan. 16, 1969. Date of death, according to the message from the Army headquarters, was Feb. 7.

A member of Warren Woods first football team in 1966, Farro, after graduation, was employed by the Chrysler Stamping Plant at Sterling. He also was taking evening engineering course in East Detroit.

The son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Farro Sr., 29453 Malvina, he has a brother, Ernest Jr., 18, a senior at Warren Woods High School and a sister, Susan, 12.
