John is buried at Resurrection Cemetery, Clinton Twp, MI

I recently heard from John's brother who filled me in on some of the details of John's death.

I was on board the USS Ranger (CVA-61) attached to VF-21 as a RIO. On Dec. 15th, 1970 I was in the ready room watching the flight monitor when we saw the COD (a C-2 cargo plane) being catapulted off of the starboard cat. It cleared the deck and then started this horrendous climb. I remember someone saying "look at the SOB climb." when it veered to the right, rolled over and crashed into the water upside down. It floated past the side of the ship and shortly thereafter sank, with no survivors.

While I did not personally know John, I just recently found out that John was the Plane Captain of that plane. I am also told that William S. Stewart and Carrol J. Deuso were also on that flight and killed along with John.

The information about that accident was that the plane was loaded with a ship generator and that the tie down must have broken with the cat shot and allowed the generator to shift aft, causing the nose of the plane to jump upward and stalling the plane. I was told that, other than the crew and one sailor going home on emergency leave, all of the other passengers were Philipino engineers that had been working in the Ranger's engine room. It was also said that the single non-crew sailor was going home on emergency leave due to his father's recent death.
